


Kahoot Trivia




Wines from Portugal





Trilogy book club members met for the first time in over two years since our imposed COVID hiatus, on Monday, August 8th.



Judy Kraus hosted our meeting in her front yard and it had all the elements of a garden party! Refreshments were delicious, and along with the tea and coffee, our conversation flowed as our group lost no time in launching into our selection Girl Runner by Carrie Snyder, an award-winning writer from Waterloo, Ontario.

We first meet Aganetha (Aggie) Smart at 104 years of age living in a long term care facility. Born in 1908, she has lived through many of the early twentieth century trials including WWI, the 1918 world-wide flu pandemic, the stock market crash and the heartbreaking loss of family members as a result.

We learn of Aggie's unique talent. She is a born runner who is exhilarated by loping along the fields and roads of her family's rural acreage. She takes delight in risky physical feats that both amaze and worry her family.

It may have all come to naught, except that Aggie moved to Toronto where her extraordinary talent is recognized and through a series of fortunate events and friendships, she is chosen to represent Canada at the 1928 Olympics in Amsterdam, as a member of the first female team of athletes ever to compete. Not only does she compete, but she wins a gold medal and instantly achieves celebrity status both in Europe and in Canada upon her homecoming.

It might seem that with such a stellar accomplishment that Aggie's life would unfold seamlessly, but she encounters events she can't predict like an unplanned pregnancy, a loss of her relationship with the father and the disappointment with her fleeting fame as an athlete.

Girl Runner stoked a lot of comments during the discussion ranging from the particularity of our own unique intelligences, the plight of young women seeking the help of midwives in ending unexpected pregnancies and the ethical issues surrounding them to the relegation of women seen as the 'weaker sex' in Olympics past and present. Our members gave Girl Runner a rating of 7 to 8 out of 10 and agreed that it was a book well worth reading.

But imagine the feminine...she, shis and shim!



We are willing to teach if you are willing to play. Come out and have some fun.









Asoka took us on a (non-classical) musical tour of WALES. It is with good reason that Wales is famous as the 'Land of Song'; its tradition goes back over one thousand years, when the first 'eistedfodd' was held under local royal patronage



(Prince Rhys ap Gruffud of the House of Dinefwr) at Cardigan Castle. The formal tradition eroded under English domination, but within the deep isolated Welsh valleys sparks of musical tradition still burned brightly. Song was tied to church, salvation, and hope; and also provided entertainment. Each valley developed its own musical traditions and had its own eisteddfod.

Most of Asoka's selections were choral – solos, groups, choirs; but also included music played on the Welsh Triple Harp and Welsh Hornpipe. So much beautiful music. And as a final treat we had a song by Wales's greatest singer, Tom Jones – "The Green Green Grass of Home". What a way to finish!

We started with Dvorak's Czech Suite and Prague Waltzes, then Smetana's evocative musical tribute to his country's major river, "The Moldau", (better known as the Vltava) which flows through the centre of Prague, under the famous Charles Bridge, with it's 30 statues, built in 1402.
