

1960 and I am in the dough! That summer I worked for POM (Pride of Montreal) bakeries. I do not recall how I obtained this job as my mother had Wonder bread delivered to our home. It was a long day for the driver as he had to pick up his truck at the bakery at 7am. By 8:15am he picked me up and my day began.

Saturday was our busiest day as we covered two neighbouring cottage towns, Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-lac and Pointe Calumet. We always carried our customers' regular needs in our dessert basket as well as extras. This gave us a chance to upsell them with cakes, pies, doughnuts, etc. Actually this was my first sales job!

The next step was telling my boss what the customer bought including crusty bread or desserts. He then entered the sales in the "bible". All items were listed on the customer's page and added to the ongoing balances.

Saturday was normally collection day with their tabs being settled. Cottage towns were great as people purchased more items than usual, mostly doughnuts and pies. They were also much better tippers. Our truck was very similar to a large UPS truck. Regretfully some of the snacks got damaged or returned by customers (wink, wink) so we ate parts of them, then returned the balance to the bakery for credit.

During very hot summer days I was permitted to drive. Wow! The two doors slid wide open while my favourite song played on the radio, "Venus in Blue Jeans". I discovered if you pulled the choke out, it acted as cruise control. WHO KNEW!

Last call was the local tavern for dinner. I was dropped off at 6:30pm and the driver returned the truck to Montreal to be cleaned and restocked for Monday.

All this for 5\$ including tips. It was GREAT!



Halton Police Scam Presentation - Thursday, October 6th

I was trying to keep this article short, but I don't know how! Whether you went to this session or to the one we had a few years ago, there is so much going on out there that we need to keep hearing about it and reminding ourselves on how easily being scammed can happen! Did you know that a high majority of scams happen to people who are over the age of 70?

Detective Constable Kevin and Detective Constable Krisandra gave us a lot of really solid information and helped us to be more aware of what is going on not just in the world but Halton! They also noted that home phones are more likely to get scam calls as it is easy to look up the phone number and address.

Here are some of the recent situations that the Halton Police have encountered:

- On October 5th the Halton Police received over 700 phone calls for people being defrauded of amounts up to \$10K (an amount not flagged by banks) and of those only three were successful in not losing their money.
- If you are doing online shopping whether it's for vitamins, beauty products, or whatever, make sure you check the terms and conditions. Sometimes they are hard to find, but you want to make sure you aren't going to be charged a monthly subscription for fake pills.
- Emergency scam targeting family members will play upon your emotions. They had three of these on October 5th alone. Don't identify the child's name as this is just giving the scammer a piece of information (or even one of your passwords). Ten years ago a grandson fraud for an Ontario based fraud ring got \$3MM out of American citizens in three months!!
- Dating and Single Scams they will appeal to your romantic and compassionate side. One woman in the Halton Region got sucked in twice. The first time it cost her \$1.2 million her life savings were lost and she had to mortgage her house. She was so sure her fiance whom she had never met loved her and was being honest with her! The second guy, the police had to convince her that it was fraud. Yikes!

What are some of the red flags to be aware of:

- Be alert to the vocabulary and grammar used in messages. Be aware of high pressured and aggressive calls and people calling with a foreign accent.
- Remember when you get emails that you are not a "taxpayer" or a "customer"- you have a name!!
- It someone wants to validate who you are, do not give your name, social insurance number and date of birth. You shouldn't have to validate who you are! And be ever so careful in not responding with a "yes" and risk it being recorded. You may find out down the road that you now have a mortgage in your name! One of

our own members has a family member who just went through this and there is nothing the police can do. The loss was in excess of \$100K.

- You should always consider validating the caller. Is it really Princess Margaret or Readers Digest calling you? Does CRA phone you? NO! They are not that progressive and they use Canada Post always!
- You just won the lottery, but you don't play the lottery and lotteries don't need to collect taxes because in Canada we don't pay tax on lottery winnings (the USA does).
- Someone walking on the street offers to do your two car driveway for \$2,000 and puts down garbage meaning not even asphalt. They will be long gone by the time you figure that you were scammed. By the way, it currently costs \$7,000 to do a two car driveway. Call reputable companies and get quotes they are usually the ones promoting themselves with their trucks with logos.

Be calm. Be your own Sherlock Holmes and remember, you can always HANG UP!

After October's meeting 29 Probus members went to Montana's for lunch (photos below). The staff were pleasant and accommodating, the food was delicious and served promptly.





Winetasting at the Tschirhart's

There was plenty to nibble on while tasting samples from three Erie North Shore wineries. We used the simple score sheet, rating the wines 1 to 5, then multiplying the scores by 4 to bring them in line with the original score sheet out of 20.

The three wineries we sampled from were *Aleksander Estate*, *Viewpointe Estate* and *Mastronardi Estate*. Our first red was a *2013 Chambourcin*, which we chose because we had been told that this wine is usually added to others, rather than used as a stand alone varietal.

The highest scoring wine of the night was *Viewpoine Big Bluff White*, with a score of 15.9. It was also the least expensive wine at \$13.35

The next highest score happened to be a red, *Mastonardi 2016 Syrah*, scoring 12.9 and has a cost of \$24.95.

Fourth was '*Roe & Company*' an Irish blended whiskey. The average score was 71.4, with an Alcohol by volume (ABV) of 45% at the cost of \$49.95 per bottle.

Fifth was 'Canadian Club 12 yr Old' a blended whiskey. The average score was 63.2, with an Alcohol by volume (ABV) of 40% at the cost of \$34.00 per bottle.

Our October crafters were working on many different projects while chatting away. Sharon was removing patches





Our Book Club was unable to meet in September so we reviewed two books at our October meeting.

Moon of the Crusted Snow by Waubgeshig Rice

This novel is set on a small First Nations reserve in northern Canada during the Fall and harsh Winter. The story follows a group of community members after they are cut off from the rest of the world by some unknown event. They lose all forms of communication, transportation and connection with others beyond their village. As time passes they experience fuel and food shortages all while enduring extreme winter weather. There is a breakdown of their society which is further exacerbated by the arrival of a white man who seeks to capitalize on the dire circumstances. In many ways the story is a metaphor for the colonization of the First Nations people by the Europeans. Their ways of life, their language and their community structures were severely threatened by the arrival of the white man both historically and in this novel.

Our group had mixed feelings about the book however it generated a lot of discussion. Elements of the story were difficult to read as they highlighted the many negative influences that have impacted the First Nations people of our country.

The Vanishing Half by Brit Bennett

This novel tells the story of twin girls Stella and Desiree who grew up in a small black, southern community of very light skinned people, a characteristic that was valued. The girls ran away from home in their teen years to live and work in New Orleans. As the story develops the girls move apart and Stella decides that she will pass for being white, while Desiree continues to live her life as black. Stella cuts off communication with her family and the years pass with Desiree looking for her sister. There are many elements to this story as the lives and families of the two girls follow very different paths. Their circumstances are very different economically, socially and emotionally. Stella constantly worries about being 'found out'.

This novel was interesting and raised a number of questions regarding race and prejudice. It was felt that there were some unnecessary story lines but overall the book was well received.

Seven Fallen Feathers by Tanya Talaga

Trilogy Book Club met at the home of Kelly Ground on Monday, October 17th to discuss our book club pick, Seven Fallen Feathers, by Tanya Talaga.

Talaga is a Toronto Star award winning investigative journalist who looks at the disappearances and deaths of seven First Nations high school students in Thunder Bay. It is a work about systemic racism, education, the failure of the policing and justice systems and Indigenous rights.

Over the span of eleven years, seven indigenous high school students die in Thunder Bay, Ontario. They were hundreds of kilometres away from their families, forced to leave home because there was no adequate high school on their reserves. Five were found dead in the rivers surrounding Lake Superior. Talaga delves into the lives of the students as well as the history of this northern city that has come to manifest Canada's long struggle with human rights violations against indigenous communities.

Our group discussion hit all the hot topics that have graced the news in recent days, seeing both sides of the argument was hard to admit for some of us. Though the consensus was that the history written about is indeed an ugly one, that has no easy fix. It was agreed that the book was very hard to read due to its subject matter, but for the same reason it is a very important read for Canadians.

All in all we would recommend the book to others.

A Month of Musical Variety!

For our first October musical excursion, I presented a program devoted to the music of the Austrian composer, Gustav Mahler (1860 – 1911), who many would regard as a "difficult" composer to listen to. His music fell out of favour after his death, but was slowly rediscovered in the 1950s, and he is now recognized as one of the western world's major composers.



Mahler's major work we heard was "Das Lied von der Erde (Song of the Earth). Described as a "symphony" when published, it comprises six songs for two singers who alternate movements.

When composing this work (after completing his Eighth Symphony), Mahler was aware of the so-called "curse of the ninth", a superstition arising from the fact that no major composer since before Beethoven had successfully completed more than nine symphonies. Fearing the curse, he decided to subtitle this work "A Symphony for Tenor, Alto Voice and Orchestra", rather than numbering it. His next symphony was numbered his Ninth, and was indeed the last he fully completed before his death!

Mozartians reaction to Mahler were mixed, from "beautiful" to "didn't really like". About what I expected; Mahler is certainly not everybody's cup of tea!

As a counterweight to my Program, Jeanne Reid (our second October presenter), treated us to "Modern Canadian Singers and Songwriters", songs by Gord Downie (The Tragically Hip), Jann Arden, Leonard Cohen, Anne Murray, David Foster. Reaction to Jeanne's program was universally positive!

Jeanne wrote (about Gord Downie): "I was inspired to make this program by the Pope's visit to Canada in June. I kept thinking how much Gord Downie would have enjoyed his presence and his words of apology and retribution. Gord worked so hard on behalf of our native people. I wished he was here to be a part of the visit."

Gord became the lead singer of the Tragically Hip when he was 20 years old. He was one of the most influential and popular artists in Canadian music history, and was heavily involved in environmental and human rights issues. Gord died of brain cancer on Oct, 17, 2017, at 53. Upon his death he was widely honoured by both by Justin Trudeau and the Canadian public. At the Toronto Maple Leaf game Oct. 18, a moment of silence was held in his honour.

Two of Gord's songs we listened to were from his album "The Secret Path", about a native boy, Chanie Wenjak, who tried to escape a Residential School and died trying to get home. Gord Downie championed his cause and wrote an album of music called "The Secret Path" which was released in 2016 and won many awards.

Trip to Norway and Sweden


The dates for our next Probus trip are September 8th to 21st, 2023, and we will be visiting the countries of Norway and Sweden.


We fly via Iceland Air to Bergen where we have a 3 night stay. A walking tour of the town takes in the colourful waterfront, the home of the composer Edvard Grieg (including a short concert) and a funicular ride up Mt. Floyen.

Norway is most famous for two things, their fjords and the Flam Railway trip and we will enjoy both on Day 4 of our trip. Sognefjord is the longest and deepest fjord and one of the most beautiful. During the 20 km. journey on the Flam Railway we will travel from the fjord up to snow covered mountains, passing by beautiful waterfalls and farms.

The second fjord we visit is called Lysefjord, where we will enjoy a cruise on an electric boat. The famous Preikestolen (Pulpit Rock) is located in this fjord, 604 metres higher than the boat.

A train ride takes us to Oslo, where we stay for 3 nights. The next day a city tour takes us to the many highlights, including Parliament,





Next stop is Stockholm and a 4-night stay. We travel by high-speed train and our luggage goes by truck (same on the train ride to Oslo). This evening a Smorgasbord dinner is planned with Aquavit tasting.

Our tour of Stockholm includes a visit to Gamla Stan, the picturesque old town, plus the Royal Palace and the City Hall, where all the Noble prizes, other than the Peace Prize are presented. We also visit the Vasa Museum, home of the Vasa ship built in 1628. The afternoon takes us for a short cruise on Lake Malaren and a visit to Drottningholm Palace, a UNESCO world heritage site.


In the countryside we visit the picturesque town of Sigtuna, founded in the year 980. We see the town hall and have free time to wander around the cobblestone streets, markets, cafes, etc. The afternoon is at leisure back in Stockholm and that evening we will have our farewell dinner at a local restaurant.

The cost for this trip is \$6,980 per person and the single supplement is \$2,100. We are usually able to arrange for a room-mate for any singles so they don't have to pay the supplement.

Exclusions are \$510 departure & fuel surcharges and travel insurance.

Included are round trip flights, accommodation, all meals as per the itinerary, all portage at hotels and all gratuities for local guides, drivers, waiters, etc.
